

Do you ever wonder how our club comes up with projects we do?

The General Federation of Women's Club was originally formed to "enhance the lives of others through community service". There are five areas of projects that have been set in stone per se by the General Federation. These five areas are: Health and Wellness, Civic Engagement and Outreach, Education and Libraries, Arts and Culture, and lastly Environment. Some of you may know them as prior names, but this year the names were modified. Each administration (which is a 2 yr term) also has signature projects. Two of these signature projects are: Advocates for Children and Domestic Violence. After new officers are elected a project list is developed at the national level and distributed to each club. These suggested projects are listed under each of the above categories and each individual club can then determine which projects they want to do and how they want to do them. Not all of the projects could possibly be done, but as other member ideas and community opportunities come up, we then act on them. Members are then, either asked or volunteer, to become Project Leaders. When an idea for a project arises, it is presented to our Executive board for approval. Sometimes the project is not doable for many reasons. Once a project is completed, within two weeks of completion, a report is written which includes a few sentences about the project, hours it took to complete it and money either spent or In kind donations. These reports are accumulated throughout the year and turned in at the beginning of the following year. The reports are judged by a panel who are non members. Awards are issued at a district, state and national level. RWC has won many awards, which are housed in the glass front curios in the fireplace room at the club. LOCAL POST OFFICE NAMED AFTER COMMUNITY ADVOCATE WOODIE RUCKER HUGHES...



This past week the House of Representatives passed my legislation to designate the facility of the United States Postal Service located at 4150 Chicago Avenue in Riverside, CA as the "Woodie Rucker-Hughes Post Office



It was a joyous moment when my colleagues in the House unanimously voted to pass my bill to rename the Riverside Post Office after an icon in our community who I was lucky to call a friend, Woodie Rucker-Hughes. Woodie dedicated her life to social justice and civil rights, to removing barriers to education to ensure students receive a quality education, and to making our community a better place for all. I'm pleased to know that we will be honoring her legacy in this way. I hope the Senate will advance this legislation so that her kindness and dedication will continue to inspire generations to come.

Woodie Rucker-Hughes was a history teacher at John W. North High School and an administrator for the Riverside Unified School District, and she also served as the NAACP Riverside Charter President. Woodie passed away in 2018 after leading a life under the mantra of "never let it rest until the good is better and the better is best."
